Many animals find fireworks scary. It is estimated that 45 per cent of dogs in the UK show signs of fear when they hear fireworks.

Firework phobia is a treatable condition and animals don't have to suffer such misery every year. Seek advice from your VET who will, if necessary, be able to refer you to a professional animal behaviorist.

There are also lots of simple things you can do to help your pet deal with fireworks. By preparing in advance before fireworks start your pet will be better able to cope with the noises

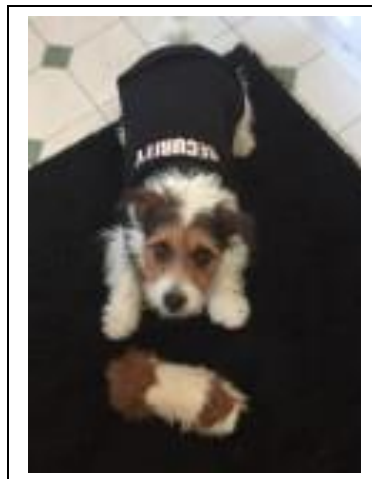


Fireworks Safety *for pets*



- Keep your pets secured INSIDE your home.** Even dogs in fenced yards find ways to escape the scary sounds.
- Give them a safe place to hide.** Set up a comfortable room or crate in your house just for them.
- Use ambient noise to mask the noise.** A radio or TV playing comforting music works well.
- Update their IDs & microchips** (just in case).
- Skip the celebration and stay home with them.** Sometimes your presence makes all the difference.
- Keep them busy.** Treat toys, like Kongs, can help distract them during the display.
